

WELCOME TO THE UNIVERSITY OF LONDON UNION



If you're studying for a University of London degree you're automatically entitled to be a member.

Membership of ULU is free and entitles you to get involved with everything the Union has to offer, as well as access to the facilities in the building on Malet Street. But what do we have to offer? Well, keep reading and you will find out! This guide has everything you need to know about us!

The University of London probably isn't what you applied to on your UCAS form. That's because it's a federal organisation based in Senate House, covering 20 or so colleges and many institutes, and you'll be studying at one or more of them. Each college has its own Students Union who will look after your interests at a local level, whilst ULU (working closely with your college Union) acts on a London wide level.

ULU is just like every Students' Union in that we are here for all 120,000 University of London Students- we are run by students for students. Student officers, are elected by all University of London students. Four are sabbatical officers, who work full-time and take a year out of their degrees to serve and further your interests and 14 are part-time officers. They are all here for you to come to with your issues and concerns, so seek them out and tell them what you think.



The governance of the University of London is defined in a series of ordinances and Ordinance 19 relates to the University of London Union. It contains a summary of the arrangements for elections, decision making and other matters and also contains a code of Practice that meets the requirements of the 1994 Education Act. Much of this material is also included in the ULU constitution and regulations, although sometimes in greater detail or using slightly different wordings. Both documents are available from the ULU website.

For the rest of my term in office, I will be launching a campaign on tackling the issue of male suicide which I had started to work on last year, as well as this, I will continue to support my colleagues and represent the views of the student body.

Students often tell me that we don't need a Women's Officer anymore, however, the facts show that this is not true.

For instance, within 5 years of graduating, women graduates will earn 15% less than male graduates WOMEN'S OFFICER

who did the same degree and got the same grades.

At ULU, we campaign for women's rights within the Union, University and beyond.



Every year ULU runs an online election so that you can decide who should form its Executive and be responsible for taking ULU forward in the year ahead.

To vote, you need to be a full member of ULU and being a student of the University of London make you eligible. Members can vote for the five full-time posts of President, VP Welfare and Student Affairs, VP Finance, Services and Operations, VP Sports and Societies and the Editor of London Student.

There are also 14 part-time Executive positions up for election every year. In order to vote, you need to get a ULU card by visiting ULU reception or by visiting www.ulu.co.uk

TRANSPORT FOR **LONDON DISCOUN**


We are sure that you have all heard of the fact that students can get a 30% discount on London's Public Transport. Did you know that was due to a campaign that ULU led? ULU has a very productive relationship with the GLA and the Mayor and this time we are asking for the transport discount to be extended to day and single tickets. The discount is a fantastic victory for students in London but for it to positively impact on all students it needs the added flexibility of single and day tickets.

The nature of student life is changing and this addition on the discount scheme would affect those students who live on a campus and don't venture far everyday, as well as those students who live and study in central London and can often walk or cycle to where they need to get to their destination.



COALITION 2010

Here ULU is working alongside the NUS to highlight the growing marketisation of Higher Education. Over the next year ULU will be developing a London-wide long term strategy about how to combat the possible lifting of the cap on fees in 2010. This year we will see the first generation of students under the top-up fees system and it is important to remind those in power of the mounting pressures of going into Higher Education, with student debt being a major concern. Therefore, its so important for us to unite and take part in the NUS National Demonstration on October 29th.



STUDENT CHARTERS

It is now more important than ever to ensure that students are getting value for money and support during their time at University.

ULU is developing four charters for groups of students that are notoriously under-represented. These charters will highlight the issues and pressures facing these groups of Students and also set some standards and demands for how to combat the problems that they face. The details of these charters will grow over the next few months as we talk to as many of you as possible. If you have any thoughts on any of the charters please Just get in touch.

International Students:

Coming to England to study can be a very confusing and difficult process! Setting up a bank account, sorting visas and finding accommodation are just a few of the issues and it is my priority to make sure more avenues of advice are available and also to campaign for International Students so they get value for money for their course and also have a fantastic experience studying away from home.

Students With Disabilities:

This group is very wide ranging from students with learning difficulties, physical disabilities and mental health issues. It's crucial these students are given more support throughout their time at University. And the stigma and prejudices surrounding them need to be removed.

Postgraduate Students' Charter: part of the Welfare Campaign

Postgraduate students make up 1/5 of the student population and the uptake of new postgraduates is constantly increasing. However, this demographic of the student body is often left out and ignored. There are many issues that are unique to postgraduate students. This can range from a breakdown of communication with the supervisor to poor quality equipment provided by the college that are necessary for the research element of postgraduate study. This year will be dedicated to putting postgraduate issues at the forefront of discussion.

Part-time and Mature Students'

Charter: part of the Welfare Campaign

Out of all of the demographic of students, Part-time and Mature students are the ones who are severely underfunded and under-resourced. The lack of crèche facilities in colleges is inadequate and there is very little knowledge of the issues that this demographic of students has to face. The needs of this group of students will be looked into on a University of London-wide basis as there are trends throughout the University regarding similar problems at college level.

LONDON WEIGH

With Top-up Fees coming into force from September 2006, the Government has reformed the way students are funded in Higher Education.

This has made it harder for students to receive adequate funding. In particular students who are based in London under the new system are only entitled to the same level of funding as a student from anywhere else up and down the country.

However, living and studying in London costs a lot of money. Whether you travel into London to study from the suburbs as a commuter or a student who is living away from home in Halls of Residence, the cost of living in London is immense. On top of the cost of living are the fees that students have to pay. Then there are the costs of



socialising, buying books, lap tops and other forms of necessary expenditure.

The aim of this campaign is to lobby the Department of Education and Skills, with the help of the GLA and the Mayor, to introduce London Weighting into the new Higher Education maintenance grant.

HOLOCAUST MEMOR

This is an event that happens every year to remember the inhumanity of fascism against an entire race of people.



The focus of this will not only be to educate people about the actions of the Nazis against the lews, but also to look at discrimination and persecution of other groups of people within society over the course of our history.

The Holocaust Memorial Week will take the format of keynote speeches, presentations and stalls where external groups can promote the work that they do and to raise awareness about certain issues that their organisation aims to resolve.

POSTGRADUATE WELFARE CENTRE

ULU prides itself on the level of expertise given in academic advice to postgraduate students.

We have a full time researcher who analyses issues regarding postgraduate students and they work alongside Daniel Snowdon, VP Welfare & Student Affairs Officer, in order to ensure that the academic lives of students at postgraduate level are as hassle free as possible.

The brand new Postgraduate Welfare

Centre aims to act as a support base for postgraduates across the University of London and serves as an information tool to help postgraduates who find themselves in awkward situations.

These can be anything from poor relations with supervisors to more specific problems to do with the course of study.

STUDENT SAFETY

ULU will be complementing the GLA/Mayors campaign about safe cabbies which will encourage students to use approved cabbies only.

Hopefully this will avoid attacks on students, especially female students, when coming home from nightclubs. Also, this campaign is an opportunity to establish links with the local and Metropolitan police in order to create a police hut around the Bloomsbury area so that Police Community Support Officer's (PC-SO's) can patrol the Bloomsbury area at night. Moreover, we will be exploring the possibility of getting a Citizens Advice Bureau set up here in ULU.

STOP CLIMATE CHAOS

The environment and more specifically climate change has been an issue that many students have an opinion on.

Daniel Snowdon, the VP Welfare and Student Affairs Officer, will be working with the Stop Climate Chaos coalition to organise a demonstration in Trafalgar Square, due to take place, on Saturday November 4th.

There will also be many campaigns on the issue of climate change that will be run in conjunction with the other college Students' Unions across the University of London.

SPORTS CLUBS & **SOCIETIES AT ULU**

Anybody from any constituent college or institute of the University of London is eligible to join the Sports teams or Societies at ULU.

Whether you are a student from one of the bigger colleges such as Kings or Imperial; or whether you are a student at one of the smaller colleges or institutes such as Heythrop or the Royal Academy of Music.

It is a tremendous way to meet and socialise with students from all across London, that you may not have otherwise met!

The majority of the Sports Clubs that ULU offer are less mainstream than you may find in one of the constituent colleges of the University of London, such as Polo, Sailing or Lacrosse.

Other ULU sports exist to promote excellence within their sport such as Rowing, Hockey and Volleyball. In each case they field teams that are supplementary to the college teams. These clubs offer specialist support to athletes who may not necessarily have the required services available at their own colleges, and compete at a high regional, national, or even international level.

ULU also provides the ULU intercollegiate Leagues and Cups. These provide a competitive platform for the constituent colleges to compete against each other, and settle some scores on the pitch with rival colleges!

There is also a broad range of Societies available at ULU from mountaineering Salsa, or from Gamesoc to Jazz (Big Band!)

The ULU societies are able to and are required to bring students from the different Colleges together, to promote and to develop their interests with like minded students from all over London.

Not only do ULU societies allow you to broaden your circle of friends, they are also a way to experience a wider range of Cultures that you may not be able to experience in your own college.

Many of the Clubs and Societies have national or even international representation, but don't let that scare you off... Everyone who is part of a particular club or society all have that one thing in common, they all share the same interest as you!

All sports clubs and societies at ULU are student led and student run. Training for Presidents and Treasurers are mandatory at the beginning of the year to make sure that the committee members have the necessary skills to run each club or society as well as possible.

This years' Freshers' Fayre will be held in the ULU building on Friday 6th October 2006, so you can meet the clubs for yourself, and get involved in ULU!

Put on your dancing feet (or 2 left feet) and learn to dance Ballroom and Latin American. Meet attractive


dancers, have fun, strut vour stuff and even compete! Ballroom dancers do it all night; where else can you swap partners all night and not catch anything?



UNIVERSITY OF LONDON

At the start of 1800s the only universities in England were Oxford and Cambridge. Entry was restricted to sons of the rich who were members of the Church of England.

The founding fathers of London's university set out to provide an institution that was open to all, irrespective of race, religion or political belief. During the 1820s a group led by Thomas Campbell, a poet, and Lord Brougham, a politician, raised money to build what is now University College London, but their hopes that this would be the University of London were dashed when the Government refused to grant them a charter to award degrees.



At the same time another group, led by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Robert Peel and the Duke of Wellington, set up a rival 'university' in the strand to be know as King's College, which admitted its first students in 1831

In 1836 the government established the University of London by Royal Charter. At first the University solely consisted of University College and King's College, but these were soon joined by other approved institutions.

The University, through its colleges, became the first to teach many subjects now taken for granted, including geography and English, and was the first to inaugurate laboratories in physics, chemistry and physiology. London was also the first in the United Kingdom to award degrees to women, when 4 female students graduated in 1880.

In 1900 the University became more than just a degree awarding body when it was given the federal and collegiate structure that, by and large, it still retains today. At present, the University of London consists of 20 self-governing Colleges of outstanding reputation, together with the prestigious School of Advanced Study and a number of other central academic activities.

Each of these colleges has it's own Students' Union and Student Representatives. You can find out more about these unions in the next few pages.

The purpose of the Students' Union is to provide services for students by students - and we do this by focusing on Representation, Resources, and Recreation (the 3 R's).



The College has among its lecturers some of the leading thinkers in their fields and its Library is possibly the finest of its kind in the U.K.

By virtue of its specialist character, Heythrop can offer a unique learning environment.

In particular, the college offers an unusually high level of personal supervision through the running of a tutorial system. This provides an invaluable complement to lecture courses by giving students the opportunity to discuss their work in detail with their teachers.

Like most of the colleges at Britain's oldest universities, Heythrop was originally a religious foundation, set up in 1614 by the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) to train its own members. Since 1970 it has been a college of the University of London, open to all.

After many moves in its nearly 400-year history, Heythrop is now situated in Kensington Square, an oasis of calm in one of the world's busiest capital cities, yet within a minute's walk of the underground, buses, cafes, bars, cinemas, and high-street stores.

Imperial College is a very strange place. Perhaps it's because we are 65% male, perhaps it's because we all study technical and scientific courses from astrophysics to zoology, or perhaps it's because we own the largest student science fiction library in Europe.

Either way, you can't escape the fact that Imperial is geekier than every other university in London. This is not a bad thing - Imperial is leading the world in research into malaria treatment, invisibility cloaks and renewable energy technology. We don't just sit around and talk about the world here; we actually try to save it.

It's fair to say that our students work hard and clichés such as "sleep is for wimps" and "work hard, play hard" are common here. As the best technical college in Europe and the highest ranking college in London, it's also fair to say that many of our students harbour mildly irritating superiority complexes. Please don't let this put you off; this is merely our way of dealing with our geekiness.

Our main campus is based in South Kensington, the cultural heartland of London, about 40 minutes from Bloomsbury. Our estate borders Hyde Park, Kensington Gardens, the Royal Albert Hall, the Victoria & Albert Museum, the Science Museum and the Natural History Museum yet somehow only a minority of students ever actually visit these great attractions.

The Imperial College Union building is, architecturally speaking, one of the most attractive buildings in the College estate largely because we chose not to demolish and rebuild it in the 1960s. Instead we have chosen to refurbish it in more sensitive manner and we are revamping our main venue, Da Vinci's, as I write (August 2006). We also run a heritage bar, which is particularly popular with students from across all of London when the sun comes out, and a nightclub venue, which is usually empty.

At Imperial the word "politics" is considered obscene. This rather pragmatic attitude has resulted in a Union devoid of party politics, anti-war council motions and NUS affiliation. That said. thanks to our vast number of well resourced clubs (279 and still rising) and our wacky federal union structure, we have some of the highest student election and club involvement rates in London. Last year 75% of our undergrads were members of at least one club and election turnout hit 50% in our medical faculty.

Outside Central London we have students based. at several West London hospitals, our Silwood Park campus near Ascot and our Wye campus in Kent. Apparently we also own a tin mine in Cornwall, a farm in Ealing, and a Nuclear Reactor in Berkshire.

So in summary: if you are a geeky girl who likes science fiction novels, a culture vulture in search of a cheap drink after a visit to the museums, or a lover of fine ales and poor architecture then this is the place for you! Do come down and say hello from time to time, just remember that we are more likely to be scared of you than you of us.

The Institute is a small, specialist establishment situated on two campuses in Chelsea and in Sutton. Our students are from many different scientific disciplines within the Biomedical and Clinical Sciences. Our Union is small, reflecting the size of The Institute, and has a membership of approximately 150 full-time and part-time PhD and MD(Res) research degrees and around 80 part-time taught postgraduate students.

Only research and taught postgraduate degrees are offered at The Institute therefore making our Union particularly unique within the University of London. We are research-led and are the only College for just postgraduate students! Yes, we have no undergraduates! This means that within our academic year we have no set terms and our research degree students work all-year-round.

Social activities for students are organised by members of the Student's Committee for students based on both sites. Last year, our annual cross-site Christmas dinner was held in central London and was an excellent opportunity for students of both sites to meet. The annual PhD Student Away Day is also organised by the Student's Association. There are also events and facilities aimed at students on the individual sites:

Chelsea Site

At the Chelsea Site students enjoy all the trappings of a central-London location. As

members of ULU, you are able to make use of the Union's facilities at Malet Street. A number of clubs also run on a regular basis, such as the highly successful Cricket Team and the recently created 5 a-side Football Squad. On the social side of things London is second to none and the Chelsea students make the most of the entertainment on offer. The sheer plethora of pubs and clubs in the Village means you can never visit them all – but we certainly try!

Sutton Site

There is a range of sporting facilities which we have access to including a swimming pool, a gym and tennis/squash courts. Sports clubs such as yoga, karate, circuit training and ultimate Frisbee are available and all students are free to join.

During the summer, a "Mini-Olympics" sporting competition between teams from different buildings takes place. Traditionally, the students organise a 6' barbeque to celebrate the sporting event at the Finals Night.

We also have our own onsite bar: "The pH Bar" at Sutton. The pH bar is open every Thursday and Friday and we all like to head down for a cheap drink or two, and enjoy a game of pool, snooker or even table football. It is provided as an amenity for everyone at The Institute and is run entirely by student and staff volunteers.





As if that wasn't enough, we also have hugely successful Sports nights, Quizzes, Acoustic



The Students' Union of the School of Pharmacy is run by an elected council of student officers, all of whom are usually undergraduates on the MPharm degree course.

The Students' Union of the School of Pharmacy facilities include the Junior Common Room (JCR), which is in the basement of the School. Both undergraduate and postgraduate students are free to use the JCR as a place to meet, eat, socialise or study during the day. The JCR Bar opens on Friday evenings to all Students' Union members and their guests.

The Students' Union of the School of Pharmacy organise a number of social events throughout the year, including annual boat parties and the Midsessional Ball in February. The Students' Union also arrange a variety of career-related events, some of which are organised in partnership with the British Pharmaceutical Students Association (BPSA). There is also a Postgraduate Society which organises regular social events specifically for postgraduate students.

The Students' Union of the School of Pharmacy supports a number of clubs and societies. The two Sports Representatives on the Union Council are responsible for the

various School of Pharmacy sports teams, including a successful football team. There are also several cultural and religious societies that are extremely active in terms of organising and promoting regular social, educational, and charitable events, all of which are open to all members of the Students' Union.

During Freshers' week, the Students' Union welcomes new students to the School of Pharmacy by holding a Freshers' Fair and putting on social and sporting ice-breaker events. Second and third year students participate in a Big Brother/Big Sister programme, supported by both the School administration and the Students' Union, to mentor first year students in their first few months at university. In recent years the Students' Union has also run a series of competitive events for both freshers and more established students called the Florence Cup Challenge, which has been designed to foster a sense of involvement and community.

UCL Union is England's oldest students' union, with the mens' union being founded in 1893 (and the women following four years later) in the interest of 'the promotion of social intercourse and of the means of recreation, physical and mental, of the students of University College, and the financial successes of students' clubs'.

Today it still exists to provide UCL students' with everything they need outside of academia, and is run by an Executive of sixteen elected members (six full-time sabbatical and ten part-time) and employing over 100 permanent staff.

UCL Union life starts on Gordon Street, WC1; at No. 15 we have the Bloomsbury Theatre Building, comprising a 500 capacity professional auditorium, in which our members perform twelve weeks of the year and also our outstanding Rights & Advice Centre on the first floor.

Further still, on the second floor is the purpose-built Clubs & Societies Centre (CSC) where our 150 different clubs and societies can meet, organise and administrate themselves, plus the innovative Voluntary Services Unit. The third floor houses our

million-pound Bloomsbury Fitness Suite, including a gym, dojo, dance studio and squash courts.

Further up the road, the real hive is the building at 25 Gordon Street, which keeps our two bars, café, hair salon, shop (there's another one in the basement of the Bloomsbury) and sabbatical office from falling out into the road.

Come down on Mondays for bhangra and shisha, Tuesday for live music and jazz jamming, Thursday night for our infamous quiz and monthly Fridays for resident LGBT night Aspire. Don't forget to go and say hello to the medics at our Huntley Street bar, and get the laughs in at the Ministry of Comedy on Wednesdays.

Outside Bloomsbury, we also have an impressive sports facility at Shenley, near St. Albans (comprising over thirty different pitches and the training space of Premier League side Watford FC) which, together with our indoor Somers Town Sports Centre in Camden helped UCLU sports teams win no less than 17 leagues and trophies last year.

The LSHTM is a leading institution in Europe for public health and tropical medicine, and is associated with the World Health Organisation.

It was first established by Royal Charter in 1924, incorporating the London School of Tropical Medicine founded in 1899. The school was established to provide the UK's major resource in postgraduate teaching and research on health in the tropics and to be the British national school of public health.

Today the LSHTM is an internationally recognised centre of excellence in public health, international health and tropical medicine with a remarkable depth and breadth of expertise.

The Royal Veterinary College has approximately 1,500 students, all training to be vets, curiously enough. The Veterinary College of London was founded in 1791 making it the country's first and largest veterinary school.

The impetus behind founding the Royal Veterinary College was to discover what made the greatest racehorse of all time, a horse called Eclipse, unbeatable on the racecourse.

The college received its first Charter of Incorporation from Queen Victoria in 1875, and was admitted as a school of the Uni-

versity of London in the Faculty of Medicine in 1949.

The College's main site is situated in Camden where we spend two years falling over minor indie bands and over eyelinered types every time we go down the pub. In the following years we move out to the tranquil countryside of Hawkshead, a country estate and farm acquired by the College in 1955, to do our clinical study.

The Royal Veterinary College continues to develop its distinctive role as the UK's first, largest, and only self-governing veterinary school.

SCHOOL OF ADVANCED STUDIES

The School of Advanced Study is comprised of ten prestigious research institutes in the humanities and social sciences.

The University of London founded the School in August 1994. The Institutes already functioned as international centres

of excellence in their respective fields but it was felt that creating a federation would act as a catalyst and support individual and collaborative research in the humanities and social sciences, not just in London, but throughout the United Kingdom and beyond.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON INSTITUTE IN PARIS

The University of London Institute in Paris, formerly the British Institute in Paris, was founded in 1894 as the Franco-British Guild.

The Institute trains professional translators of French and English and English language teachers to Certificate, Diploma and MA level. It publishes an academic journal, Franco-British Stud-

ies and offers a BA Honours course in French Studies, leading to a University of London degree taken entirely in Paris.

At MA level it specialises in Contemporary French Studies as well as translation and foreign language teaching. A range of specialised diplomas in English and French are awarded under the aegis of the University of London.



UNIVERSITY MARINE BIOLOGICAL STATION, MILLPORT

The Station's origins can be traced back more than a century to the earliest days of organised marine biology in Scotland.

The University Marine Biological Station, Millport (UMBSM) is located on the eastern shore of Great Cumbrae Island in the Firth of Clyde. It is ideally situated for marine biological teaching and research, being sheltered and close to examples of a variety of marine habitats, such as rocky, sandy and muddy shores, salt marshes, a large estuary, and deep water with soft mud, gravel and rocky bottoms. The station provides marine biological teaching support to the University of London.

HELPING YOU WITH HOUSING

University of London Housing Services

Our aim is to help students of the University to find good quality, safe and affordable housing and to support them if they run into difficulties.

We try and take some of the anxiety out of looking for and living in housing in the private sector.

We have a large database of registered landlords and agencies advertising accommodation in the private sector. In order to register, landlords and agencies have to agree to abide by our Code of Good Practice.

We also offer the opportunity for students to make use of the computer terminals and telephones in order to contact landlords.

We also have 4 dedicated housing advisors offering comprehensive housing advice. This is designed to make sure that students make informed decisions about their housing and if students do run into difficulties then we can advise and support them through their concerns and issues and if necessary, we can also rely on our firm of retained solicitors.

For the 3rd consecutive year we have worked alongside the GLA and with the support from the Department of Communities and Local Government we have produced the London Student Housing Guide, tips and advice on housing issues. These can be found in most college accommodation offices, as well as the 4th Floor of ULU, or alternatively you can visit the London Student Housing website www.studenthousing.lon.ac.uk/cms

We also offer University managed self-catering flats and houses for around 242 full-time students through the Property Management Unit. These are situated in North London and South East London and will be an option for those studensty wanting to have the University as their landlord. The Housing Situation in London

In a recent survey of students, 88% said that they were either satisfied or very satisfied with their current housing however, we have found that the biggest problem that students always have with their

landlords is with the return of the deposit after the end of the tenancy. We are pleased to say that this statistic will be hopefully changing from April 2007, with the implementation of the Tenancy Deposit Scheme.

Another fundamental issue affecting students with housing in London is probably its cost. Average rents in London are still very high. Although it is still possible to find housing in London on a budget of £75 per week, if students want to live centrally, they can expect to pay over £120 per week.

And some final advice, Don't Panic!

Don't make snap decisions because you feel under immense pressure to find somewhere quick, as this may cloud your judgement and can often involve making the wrong decision.

There are a number of invaluable sources to search for accommodation and we are happy to advise and support you in your search.






